
The Redeemer of Blood



The Rebellious Son

Deuteronomy 21:18-21 (NKJV)

¹⁸ "If a man has a stubborn and rebellious son who will not obey the voice of his father or the voice of his mother, and who, when they have chastened him, will not heed them, ¹⁹ then his father and his mother shall take hold of him and bring him out to the elders of his city, to the gate of his city. ²⁰ And they shall say to the elders of his city, 'This son of ours is stubborn and rebellious; he will not obey our voice; he is a glutton and a drunkard.' ²¹ Then all the men of his city shall stone him to death with stones; so you shall put away the evil from among you, and all Israel shall hear and fear.



- Rabbi Shimon: "There has never been such a son and there never will be one in the future. Why then was it written? So that we should study the passage and receive reward for it." (Sanhedrin 71a)
- R. Yose the Galilean: "Torah foresaw the ultimate destiny of the stubborn and rebellious son. Having disspated his father's wealth, he would seek to satisfy his wants and be unable to do so. He would then go to a crossroads and rob. Therefore the Torah ordained: Let him die innocent rather than die guilty—for the death of the wicked benefits both them and the world." (Sanhedrin 71b)
